



State-level Data for Accredited Graduate Medical Education Programs in the US: 2010-2011

To obtain detailed information about residents and educational features of residency programs, the American Medical Association (with the Association of American Medical Colleges) annually surveys all residency programs accredited by the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME), as well as all combined specialty programs. In 2010 we surveyed 8,967 accredited and combined specialty programs. We asked program directors to update and confirm the prefilled resident and program information available from prior years' surveys and from the 2010 National Resident Matching Program (NRMP). We also asked for information on new residents that were not added through the NRMP. Eighty-five percent (7,601) provided updated data on all residents. For the 712 programs that did not provide updated resident data, residents were advanced into the next year of training or were "graduated," based on information from the previous year's survey.

Survey results are presented in *State-level Data for Accredited Graduate Medical Education Programs in the US: 2010-2011*, which provides aggregate statistics for each state on resident physicians enrolled in graduate medical education (GME) in 2010-2011. There are six different tables for each state, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia, as well as six tables for the United States overall. Table 6 provides information about the plans of graduating residents, as reported by program directors, which may be useful for workforce planning. In some states program directors did not provide this information for a significant portion of residents; please interpret the data accordingly. The data in these tables reflect the accuracy with which program directors or their designees completed the survey.

The term resident physician refers to any physician training at any level in an ACGME accredited residency or combined specialty program, including physicians in subspecialty programs. The type of medical school of graduation (allopathic, osteopathic, foreign, Canadian) is distinguished in these tables. Allopathic and osteopathic graduates are also distinguished by whether their medical school was in the same state as the training program. Program year refers to the current year of training within a program, and therefore may not correspond to the number of years the resident has been in GME. The term graduate year 1 (GY1) is used to indicate residency positions that are available upon graduation from medical school; previous GME is not required. Table 4 for each state and the US presents the number of residents in GY1 positions who have not have prior US GME and are first-time entrants into the US GME system. About 4% of all GY1 residents have had previous GME, and are not included in Table 4.
