

# Young Physicians Section Delegate's Report from the 2018 Annual Meeting

The Young Physicians Section (YPS) of the AMA was an active and integral part of the AMA House of Delegates (HOD) meeting in Chicago. Preliminary handbook review committee recommendations were made available to members of the YPS Assembly prior to the meeting. Our Assembly debate on these issues was important to developing the YPS position on each resolution and report. Following our Assembly meeting, an action document with talking points for all YPS active positions was created for members to use throughout the meeting.

Our team approach allows more young physicians to speak on behalf of the YPS in front of the reference committees, and it enables our members to bring YPS issues to their state and specialty caucuses. Without the assistance of members of our Assembly, your delegate and alternate delegate would not only have been unable to speak to all of these items, but would have been far less effective at building consensus between caucuses on our key issues. Thank you to all who participated, we simply could not do it without you.

In our YPS Reference Committee, four resolutions and four reports were considered and the results can be found in the attached AMA-YPS Final Actions:

- YPS Resolution 1: Young Physician Involvement in Maintenance of Certification
  Resolution 1 asked the AMA to submit comments to the American Board of Medical Specialties
  (ABMS) on its Continuing Board Certification: Vision for the Future initiative. The purpose of the
  comments was to request that junior diplomates are provided an equal opportunity to serve on the
  ABMS and its member boards. In addition, Resolution 1 asked the AMA to directly work with the
  ABMS to encourage the inclusion of younger physicians on the ABMS and its member boards.
- YPS Resolution 2: Improving Prevention and Emergency Response through Flexible Public Health Funding Based on Population Risks

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Resolution 2 asked the AMA to encourage federal, state, and local agencies to partake in syndromic surveillance, assess risks of local populations for disease, and develop comprehensive plans with other stakeholders to enact actions for mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery in the event of unexpected infectious disease outbreak.

- YPS Resolution 3: Taking Steps to Advance Gender Equity in Medicine
  Resolution 3 asked the AMA to conduct various initiatives to support the advancement of gender
  equity in medicine.
- YPS Resolution 4: Advancing the Goal of Equal Pay for Women in Medicine
  Resolution 4 asked the AMA to conduct various initiatives to support equal pay for women in
  medicine.

# Report C: Specialty Society Representation and Outreach
