Risk Model Programming

The IPPS met on Friday, June 8, for a full day of programming devoted to risk models. The programs were presented in partnership with America's Physician Groups. The overarching theme, supported by members of the IPPS, was that value-based care is not a passing fad but is here to stay. The IPPS is committed to advancing risk-based models that support cost effective, high quality care.

Initial polling of over 80 attendees showed that 85% of the organizations represented at the meeting participated in some form of risk payment model; almost half (46%) participated in bundled payment models, and 15% were at full risk. The vast majority (85%) reported their organizational income from risk was 25% or less.

The morning program included presentations on five risk models including clinical care bundles, MSSP Track I, primary care risk, professional and full risk. Roundtable discussions enabled attendees to break into groups of beginner, intermediate and advanced. The afternoon program was dedicated to CMMI's new Bundled Payments for Care Improvement Advanced (BPCI Advanced) presented in part by Steven Farmer, MD, Senior Advisor & Senior Medical Officer, the Center for Medicare & Medicaid Innovation. IPPS members were able to interact with Dr. Farmer and share both their concerns and support for the work being done at CMMI.
