Background and Objectives

The AMA Advocacy Resource Center conducts an annual state legislative and regulatory priorities survey among state and national medical specialty societies.

Objectives:

- 1. To identify trends for the upcoming 2021 state legislative sessions.
- 2. To get a clear picture of the top issues facing organized medicine at the state level.

The survey results guide how the AMA allocates its state advocacy resources in the coming year and fosters alignment of priorities between the AMA and the state and national medical specialty societies.



Overview of Study Design

Methodology: An online survey was distributed to representatives of state and national medical specialty associations from November 5, 2020 - December 2, 2020 using the Qualtrics survey platform.

Sample Size: The 75 respondents are broken out by Association as follows:

- Data is reported for total respondents, state medical association respondents, and national medical specialty association respondents separately when the total responses are equal to or greater than 30.
- When the total responses are less than 30, results are reported only for total respondents.
- For questions on the specific legislative issues, data is presented in counts, not percentages.







2021 Top Legislative and Regulatory Priorities



For the total survey respondents, the top legislative priorities in 2021 are expected to be COVID-19, Scope of Practice, Digital Health, Private Health Insurance Practices, Public Health, Medicaid, and Opioid and Drug Overdose Epidemic issues.






Q9 - Which of the following legislative or regulatory issues does your association expect to work on in 2021? Select all that apply.








Q11 - Which of the following antitrust or health insurance issues does your association expect to work on in 2021? Select all that apply.






Among those planning to work on business of medicine issues, 14 of the 29 expect to see activity related to physician taxes.




Among those planning to work on COVID-19 issues, two-thirds (46 of 68) expect to see activity related to vaccine distribution, financial assistance and liability immunity.

Most respondents planning to work on the top three COVID issues say they will "strongly support and plan to actively engage" on those issues.




Q11 - Which of the following antitrust or health insurance issues does your association expect to work on in 2021? Select all that apply.





Among those planning to work on data/EHR issues, for 11 of the 17 respondents, the priority issue in 2021 will be interoperability of EHRs.




Q14 - Which of the following data/EHR issues at the state level does your association expect to work on in 2021? Select all that apply.









Q15 - Which of the following digital health issues does your association expect to work on in 2021? Select all that apply.








Q17 - What type of work does your association plan to undertake on the following telemedicine issues in 2021?




TELEHEALTH DUE TO COVID-19



Q18 - Is your association's work on telehealth due to COVID-19?




Thirty-seven (37) of the 42 respondents planning to address Medicaid issues anticipate working on physician reimbursement.




Q20 - What type of work does your association plan to undertake on the following Medicaid issues in 2021?






Caps on damages will be a priority for 17 of the 34 respondents planning to address medical liability reform issues.



Q21 - Which of the following medical liability reform issues does your association expect to work on in 2021? Select all that apply.




Most of those planning to undertake caps on damages will "strongly support and plan to actively engage" on the issue.

More than half (10 of 17) of those who will work on caps on damages do not know if they anticipate a judicial challenge or legislative challenge.







Q25 - Which of the following medical licensure issues does your association expect to work on in 2021? Select all that apply.





For those planning to work on the interstate medical licensure compact, 5 of the 12 say they are unsure if their state is considering adoption.








Most of those planning to work on opioid prescribing restrictions say they will focus on preventing new or additional restrictions (12 of 15 respondents).




For those planning to work on medication-assisted treatment issues, the priority for 18 of the 26 respondents will be removing prior authorization by commercial payers and/or Medicaid.






Q33 - Which of the following mental health and substance use disorder parity issues does your association expect to work on in 2021? Select all that apply.


Q34 - Which of the following pharmaceutical issues does your association expect to work on in 2021? Select all that apply.








Many respondents who plan to work on physician workforce issues anticipate activity related to expanding medical residency positions (25 of 37) and resident retention plans (23 of 37).










Q38 - Which of the following credentialing issues, including no-cause termination does your association expect to work on in 2021? Select all that apply.








61% of respondents planning to work on private health insurance say they don't have the bandwidth or resources this year to address some of the issues they would like.








Q42 - Which of the following public health issues does your association expect to work on in 2021? Select all that apply.






















Q50 - Which of the following LGBTQ issues does your association expect to work on in 2021? Select all that apply.














Q56 - What type of work does your association plan to undertake on the following vaccine issues in 2021?






Among the 64 respondents planning to work on scope of practice issues, 41 anticipate activity related to nurse practitioners, while 38 anticipate activity related to physician assistants.



Q59 - Which of the following scope of practice issues does your association expect to work on in 2021? Select all that apply.




Most of those who plan to focus on physician assistants and nurse practitioners will "strongly oppose and plan to actively engage."







The majority of respondents focusing on scope of practice say proposed legislation for those issues does not require a PHE waiver.




LEGISLATION TO REMOVE OR WEAKEN PHYSICIAN SUPERVISION/ COLLABORATION

Among those who plan to work on scope of practice issues related to pharmacists, the majority of respondents anticipate legislation related to the administering of vaccines.


ANTICIPATE LEGISLATION RELATED TO PHARMACISTS ADMINISTERING VACCINES




Q63 - Do you anticipate legislation related to pharmacists administering vaccines?



Among the 30 respondents who anticipate legislation related to pharmacists administering vaccines, most anticipate legislation on both COVID and childhood vaccines.





