	SPS Education Program: Title: Loneliness and Social Isolation: A New Social Driver of Health in Older Adults?		
	Speaker: Peter A. Hollmann, MD, Chief Medical Officer for Brown Medicine and a member of the Division of Geriatrics (and current SPS liaison from Rhode Island)		
	Program Description: The COVID-19 pandemic and subsequent social distancing measures have significantly impacted the well-being of older adults. While loneliness and social isolation are different phenomena, an increased incidence of psychological, cognitive, and physical health issues (including cardiovascular morbidities) and lower perceived well-being or quality of life (NIH) highlights the need to address this issue. In this session, participants will explore how to identify the challenges faced by individuals affected by loneliness and isolation, discuss interventions aimed at addressing or preventing these issues and review the revised UCLA Loneliness Scale.
