It is with great pleasure that I write this letter of recommendation for Student Doctor Erika LaBelle as she applies for the student position on the American Medical Association's Governing Council, Minority Affairs Section. I am the chair of the Osteopathic Principles and Practice (OPP) department as well as the course director for the 1st, 3rd, and 4th year OPP courses at Rocky Vista University College of Osteopathic Medicine (RVUCOM) in Colorado. At RVUCOM I have had the honor of working with outstanding students as part of our curriculum, including Student Doctor Erika LaBelle. I have worked with Erika for the last three years and have found her to possess traits I feel are necessary for a successful future physician. Those traits I have observed, and will discuss below, are intelligence, leadership, compassion and empathy.

Erika is excelling at Rocky Vista University.
