Kameryn J. Lee, MD, MSPH, (pronouns: she/her) is the vice president for medical affairs and health equity at FOLX Health, a telehealth company that focuses on competent and affirming queer and trans health care delivery.

Dr. Lee is board-certified in obstetrics and gynecology and is fellowship-trained in minimally invasive gynecologic surgery and gynecologic endoscopy. After earning her undergraduate degree in chemical engineering from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Dr. Lee received a Doctor of Medicine degree from the University of North Carolina School of Medicine, and a Master of Science in public health degree from the University of North Carolina Gillings School of Global Public Health. She was one of nine UNC graduate school students selected for the Weiss Urban Livability Fellowship.

After medical school, Dr. Lee completed an internship in general surgery at Vanderbilt University Medical Center and residency training in obstetrics and gynecology at Meharry Medical College. Since finishing subspecialty fellowship training in minimally invasive gynecologic surgery and gynecologic endoscopy at MedStar Washington Hospital Center (District of Columbia), Dr. Lee's practice has focused on advanced laparoscopic and hysteroscopic surgery for multiple conditions as well as transgender medicine. Currently, she is on the board of Diversity in Recovery, an LGBTQ-focused recovery program based in central Virginia. As a graduate student at Pacific School of Religion (Berkeley, Calif.), she is a member of the eight-member 2020–2021 National Transgender Seminarian Leadership Cohort. Dr. Lee is a frequent speaker, lecturer and teacher on issues concerning the lived intersections of people pushed to the societal margins, including Black, brown, queer and gender diverse individuals.

Dr. Lee was born and raised in North Carolina, and she is committed to the push for equity and justice in Black, Indigenous, Latinx, people of color and gender diverse communities.
